Connecting with Mentors

Find time to connect, reflect, and engage in learning through observation.

BRIGHT IDEAS

Research shows that having a colorful, inviting classroom improves student learning. As well, displaying student work promotes a sense of autonomy and positive expectations for learning. But what to do with a big, blank bulletin board when students haven't created anything yet?

Cover plain bulletin boards with colorful paper and borders. But, build students' curiosity and anticipation by including only an intriguing title, indicating the learning, creating, and collaboration they can look froward to in their new classroom.

Here are some ideas for titles:

Adventure is out there... Where will yours take you?

Look who's popping into 2nd grade! (popcorn theme)

Chicka Chicka Boom Boom, Look Who's in Our Room! (Chicka Boom book theme)

Welcome to Kindergartern! You'll FIT Right In! (puzzle pieces theme)

Take What You Need (sticky notes of encouragement cover the board)

Help Wanted (newspaper theme with classroom jobs posted)

I Used to Think... Now I Know... (students would fill this in)


Any inspiring quote!
