ZUZIM GARCIA

Walla Walla High School senior Zuzim Garcia dreams of one day being a neurosurgeon. Zuzim has enlisted in the Army to become a combat medic. After his military service, he will enroll at Eastern Washington University with plans to transfer to the University of Washington for medical school. He's been active at Walla Walla High School during his four-year career. Zuzim is the Battalion Commander, which is the highest ranking student in the JROTC. Wa-Hi's JROTC program was recently awarded the highest rating in JROTC by earning the Honor Unit with Distinction (HUD), Gold Star. Less than 10% of all JROTC programs qualify for the HUD status.

"I appreciate all of the JROTC instructors for motivating and pushing us to meet our potential," says Garcia. "They really push you to be better and to achieve what you might think you can't achieve."

Zuzim has also been involved in Latino Club all four years in high school, serving as vice president, secretary and the social media coordinator.

"I would like to thank our Senior Army Instructor CSM (R) Anthony Marrero, Bill Erickson, the Latino Club Advisor, and Shavna Hutchens for introducing me to the ASB," said Garcia. "All these great leaders have helped me become the person I am



HISTORIC SIGN CRAFTED BY MAC BLEDSOE FINDS FOREVER HOME ON WA-HI'S GYM ENTRANCE WALL

The Bledsoe connection to Walla Walla began before the family ever moved to the valley. Mac Bledsoe was teaching and coaching in the Kiona-Benton School District when Class of 1983 graduate Blaine Bennett, whose father "Shorty" Bennett was a longtime friend of Mac, called to inquire about a sign for the Class of 1983 senior project. Mac had a side business at his home in Benton City making redwood signs. He jokes he was making more money in the sign business in those days than he was teaching and coaching.

Blaine Bennett, and his buddy ASB President Scott Krivoshein, asked if Mac could make a Walla Walla High School sign to mount on campus. It didn't take long for Mac to agree to take the job on. Mac didn't have much to go on for a design for the sign, so he reached out to Shorty and picked up one of his Wa-Hi hats, which donned the iconic WW letters logo. The design for the massive 12' wide by 6' high redwood sign took off from there.

Mac's son Drew, who would go on to star at quarterback for Washington State University and in the National Football League, was a 6th grader when Mac began making the sign using a sandblaster to carve out the sign's image. Drew's job was to keep the industrial sandblaster full of sand.

"Drew takes great pride in that sign because he did a lot of work with me," said Mac, who was a fixture on the offensive line for the University of Washington football team from 1964-68. "That sign was a big old hummer. I could prop one end up and Drew would lift the other end.

We'd tip it and turn it and move it so that I could do the work on it that had to be done.'

Once Mac and Drew finished the sign, they loaded it into Mac's truck and drove it down to Walla Walla where it became a landmark on the campus on the corner of Fern Ave and Abbott Road for nearly 40 years. During the recent bond construction project, the sign's original location made way for the school's expanded school bus lane. This winter the historic redwood sign was permanently mounted in the new entrance to the main gym where it will remain for everyone to enjoy.


The Bledsoe family moved to Walla Walla where Mac and his wife Barbara would teach, coach and continue raising their family of two boys; Adam and Drew. Mac Bledsoe's life has always been full of adventure. He served as an officer in the Army, played professional football in the 1960s and has taught parenting classes in all 50 states. He's a natural storyteller. During a recent visit to Walla Walla High School to see the new location of his sign, he soon had a group of Wa-Hi softball players gathered around listening intently as he explained the importance of hard work and commitment to be successful in sports and life. He even remembered teaching some of the players' parents, noting specific examples of a classroom experience he had with them as if it happened just yesterday.

Mac Bledsoe is well revered in Walla Walla and the school sign he created four decades ago will be forever etched as an important chapter



- Repairing the 43-year-old Garrison tennis courts and resurfacing the 20-year-old track
- Installing high quality artificial turf playing surfaces and field lighting at both Wa-Hi fields
- Installing outdoor lighting at the varsity baseball/softball fields
- Installing elevated bleachers with ADA access at Klicker Field
- Providing adequate access to restrooms and changing rooms
- Constructing a JROTC "Raider" obstacle course for student, first responder and community use

improvements associated with the turf fields, track improvements and lighting upgrades.

"Hellas' Matrix Helix Turf fields with allnatural infills, and their epiQ Tracks® surface represent the safest, fastest and most durable systems in the industry," said Superintendent Dr. Wade Smith. "Additionally, the state-ofthe-art, low-spill/low-glare LED Ephesus field lighting is considered to be the most neighbor-

friendly sports lighting system on the market." At Walla Walla High School, a groundbreaking ceremony was held to mark the beginning of this historic work. Slated to be completed by early fall on the Wa-Hi campus are the 8 new tennis courts, JROTC "Raider" obstacle course, both artificial turf fields and field lights. The Klicker Track at Wa-Hi will be resurfaced and the safer track throwing events area will be developed north of the existing track. The new track at Pioneer Middle School is also scheduled to be completed by September, along with the repair and resurfacing of the Garrison Middle School track. Lights at both the softball and baseball fields at Murr Sports Park are estimated to be finished by winter. The Wa-Hi football team will play at Borleske Stadium this upcoming season for the last time

before transitioning to the Wa-Hi campus in the Fall 2025, a year prior to earlier

"Once we complete the bulk of the field, court and track improvements we will begin transitioning into the second phase of the projects, focusing on bleachers,

restrooms and other site improvements." noted Superintendent Smith. "Our improved construction phasing will have us wrapping up all of the voter-approved projects by fall of 2025, one full school year ahead of original schedule."

Helping students learn to read is personal for district Literacy Specialist Melissa Carter. As a child growing up in Beaverton, Oregon just outside of Portland, reading was difficult for Melissa. She was a non-reader until the end of third grade. These struggles with reading made her physically ill and anxious as a child. Sometimes she would refuse to go to school and found no delight in reading for pleasure. Fortunately, her parents found her a reading specialist and she slowly improved her skills.

"College was difficult for me and reading aloud in public still gives me challenges," said Carter, who now holds two master's degrees and a bachelor's degree. "I've made it my life's mission to help students learn to read so they don't face the same challenges I have experienced throughout my life."

"Parents often ask what they can do to help their child learn to read," says Carter. "I encourage them to have back and forth conversations with their child because reading is connected to sounds. In the primary years, it's important to read with the child and ask them simple questions, point to pictures and sound out the words for the child."

Melissa Carter smiles when being referred to as the "Reading Whisperer," knowing her life's mission to help students learn to read is making a difference on campuses across the district.

US News honors Wa-Hi

Walla Walla High School earned high national and state rankings in 2024 Best High Schools, which U.S. News released this spring. Ranking factors include college readiness, access to college-level curriculum, state assessment proficiency and graduation rates.

"We are so pleased to learn that Wa-Hi again earned recognition as a U.S. News Best High School," said Walla Walla High School Principal John Schumacher. "We ranked in the top 1/3 of all high schools in the state and nation, boasting especially high marks on our college readiness and breadth index, in addition to our strong graduation rates, and reading and science scores."

By earning a national ranking in the top 40%, Walla Walla High School achieved status as a U.S. News Best High School and gained eligibility to display a U.S. News-trademarked 2024 Best High Schools award. Wa-Hi's ranking landed them as one of the top-rated high schools in the entire region.
